# Presenting the Case to College Students.

AST month we ventured to publish a fairly full synopsis of a popular treatment of the subject, "Missions to Moslems," used while home on furlough during the past year. One of the chief attractions of the furlough, however, was the promise of opportunity to appeal to students during their training for the ministry. The notes here appended were used over and over again in a very happy tour in England, Scotland and Wales. We hope that some members about to take furlough, realizing the need of recruits, will have their thoughts directed to the task of bringing the claims of Moslems before student audiences.

The present lecture assumes an elementary knowledge of Islam.

- Apart from numerical strength and significant distribution of Moslems, there is a tremendous rebuke and challenge in this—the Early Christian Church failed Md. at a critical period in his mental and spiritual development.
  cp. Md.'s sources—unscrupulous Jews (re. prophecies in the O.T.)—unworthy Christians (Collyridian heresy re. Trinity and Gnostic heresy re. Person of Christ).
  Md. fulminated against these early and late.
  (Christian doctrine of Christ, derogatory to God.
  (Christian doctrine of Trinity, blasphemous because idolatrous—and, Jesus must be saved from the shame of death on Cross.)
  These protests are of value if only because they compel us to revise of our way of stating Christian doctrine.
- 2. Md.'s denunciations denials and assertions are preserved in the Quran and are quoted by way of retort to this day. (verses cited from Quran in support.)

3. How then should we approach these Moslems? With understanding, sympathy, and friendship.

They are primarily the victims of the blunders of others.

15 years ago the challenge was put thus: "Islam defies your King."

It can be stated in a more appealing way: "Islam is a moon aclinaing the sun of Christianity"

eclipsing the sun of Christianity."

These are not a people without a vestige of knowledge of Christianity, but a people labouring under strange delusions

about the Christ Himself.

4. What should be the method of our approach?

There has been too much FRONTAL ATTACK in the past. Islam is strongly entrenched and not to be easily dislodged.

Experience indicates that progress will be slow and rather

through indirect methods.

'Slow' because of wide, spread illiteracy—(we can assist with schools, lantern lectures, medical missions and simple literature.) 'Slow' because of prevalent prejudice mere TERMS (conveying wrong ideas, it is true) rouse

Moslem prejudice and hostility. They have been taught to

hate the very sound of such as:

'The Son of God'; 'God the Father,' 'The Trinity.' A single Moslem can prejudice a whole audience against a preacher by reference to any of these terms.

Need we use these terms in dealing with the prejudiced?

'We must cultivate a Moslem side to our brain (become a Moslem to Moslems).

We need to get at the man behind the Moslem-

Be as "wise as serpents."

take him unawares!

- 5. What sort of men does the task require?
  - (a) of right type, polite (cf. Moslem courtesy). above reproach (cf. Moslem scrutiny), ready to serve (they need a friend).

men of prayer—students of Scripture. men for whom Christ is central and sufficient.

who know by experience His grace and power.

who cherish His companionship.

who reflect His Spirit.

(b) of adequate training.

with general knowledge of outlines of Islam.

(more advanced courses can be taken on the field.)

while yet in college: well to realise value of Hebrew (for Arabic), German and French.

all of which should enable us to study and develop another method for dealing with Moslems:

In military tactics there is the device of "drawing the enemy out of his trenches."

This suggests the Christian method par excellence and has the Master's own sanction: "I, if I be lifted up, will draw all men unto Me,"

We, His followers and messengers, need in all our walk and conversation with these Moslems, to reflect His Spirit that they may be drawn to Christ by the Christlikeness they see in us.

No pious Moslem despises a Christlike missionary.

# The Islamic Studies Circulating Ribrary

(under the auspices of the M. M. League)

O far as we are aware no reference was made during 1924 in the pages of N. & N. to the existence of the I. S. C. Library and terms of membership. In the view of the fact that about a hundred new people have joined the League in the interval, we venture to refer once again to the fact that valuable books on Islam are available on very easy terms.

The Library is in the custody of the Secretary, and membership is open to all members of the League residing within the Indian Postal area on payment of an annual subscription of One Rupee only. The League Committee has further agreed that members ordinarily resident outside the Indian Postal area shall be entitled to take advantage of the Library, whenever, by coming to reside for a time within the Indian area, they are in a position to do so. We would ask members working in Arabia and Mesopotamia kindly to bear this in mind.

The Library came into existence through the very generous donation of a friend keenly interested in the evangelisation of Moslems. The Committee has decided that members can, if they prefer, become 'Life members' of the Library on making a single payment of fifteen rupees.

#### Modernism in Mecca

HE strange blend of Eastern tradition and custom with Western science and progress introduced by King Husein into Mecca, is not generally known to people in the West.

King Husein had at Mecca a powerful wireless station, but it was reserved entirely for official use, to convey his instructions and rebukes to subordinate rulers of his domains. It is said that once, when the King was angrily censuring one minor chief, the ether was so filled with his violent messages that British warships in the Red Sea miles away found their wireless temporarily useless. Mecca has a telephone system, too, but King Husein insisted that his number should be "No 1. Mecca," and that every other telephone instrument should be automatically disconnected when the receiver of his instrument was removed, lest there should be an eavesdropper of the royal conversation or his dignity should be wounded by the reply from the exchange, 'Number engaged, please call later.' Mecca has a fairly efficient postal service, and the country is a member of the International Postal Union, with its own postage stamps, printed in Cairo. Some modern buildings have been erected, but the city remains generally in appearance as it was centuries ago. Sanitation has been greatly improved, and during the pilgrimages, which bring normally some two hundred thousand visitors annually, much stricter hygienic precautions are imposed. There is a weekly paper, El Kibla, in Arabic, of which King Husein himself was editor-inchief, and often actually composed the leading articles, always reading each issue in proof before publication. A little time ago a correspondent of The Times described King Husein and His Heir apparent, the Emir Ali, hard at work with fountain-pens, correcting Arabic galley-proofs, a matter of great technical skill, improving the grammar, and polishing the periods of the next issue of the paper adapted.

# The Power of a Portionette. Wanted better distribution.

The publications of the Nile Mission Press are distributed far and wide; in fact they go to thirty lands. The heartiest of all welcomes comes from the most barren of all lands—North and East of Arabia. Why is this? It may possibly be traceable to the infectious example of S. M. Zwemer, the man who is in dead earnest about the distribution of literature. We all know how few literary writers there are, but only God fully realises how many less there are that really care about distribution! We discuss portionettes, and some are told off to arrange and edit portionettes, others to print and publish portionettes—but how many of us are willing to "step down

from our pedestal" to give away portionettes, aye, even in the public street? These simple leaflets contain the dynamic of the divine decree—put it into action, let it function, be the connecting link in the providence of God. O for workers, O for greater interest in such tracts, O for a re-indusment of the fire of God!

Here an incident to encourage us all:-

Away in Iraq, a mission colporteur tried to sell a New Testament to a Moslem, but the man would not have it; then he tried a "portion," i.e., a single Gospel, but with the same result. At last he gave him, free, a fourpage portionette from the N.M. Press, and left him.

After a few days the local missionary was interested to receive a call at the Bible-depot from this very man, who explained that he liked the portionette so much that he now wanted a Gospel; later on he came to buy

a New Testament.

In the life of this one Moslem, who shall estimate "The Power of a Portionette"?

Dr. Zwemer writes.—'My work at Princetown (he has been giving a course of lectures there) is completed. Now come two busy weeks campaigning in the West for our own Church, then Washington, and after that I sail. My address will be c/o American Mission, Cairo, where I hope to arrive by February 20th at latest.'

In a later letter he says: 'I leave Cairo at the end of April to be present at the May meetings (in London), on request, from May 1st to 15th; then sail for South Africa in response to an invitation received from the United Mission Council'. Dr. Zwemer will value the prayers of the members of the League.

The Founder of the League, Rev. John Takle, writes:-" How the

membership has grown! I am glad.

I am sorry to tell you that medical opinion is against my return to India. I resigned at the annual conference of our mission last October, after 28 years service...I am not fit for regular work...To be cut off from work in Bengal is like losing a limb, but there may be work for us here...... My warmest greetings to the brotherhood."

Mr. B. M. Mow, a new member, writes:— Our Mission (Church of the Brethren) has appointed me to begin work among the Moslems of our district as soon as 1 am ready. I am studying the language at present. We all are laying much hope on this new work.

We regretfully report the death at home on furlough of one of our members—Miss L. Walker of the Friends' Mission—formerly at work in the interesting city of Bhopal.


Our membership now stands at 522.
